

SATO LA MARINA BLOTTED OUT.

Tidal Wave Literally Destroys Mexican Town Near Tampico.

Mexico City, Sept. 7 .- Word was received here tonight that the destruction of Soto La Marina, a town in the state of Tamaulipas, was so complete that the whole place has completely disappeared, with the exception of a few church towers that seem to project from the surface of the sea. The tidal wave which destroyed the place has almost obliterated the snot on which it stood. No one has been able to get closer than a league from where the port once stood. From this point rescue parties have discovered tents on the side of a small hill, the only evidence of life left.

A Mexicon Herald special from Tampico says that the steamer Sonora left that port this afternoon for the neighborhood of Soto La Marina.

The town is on a river, some miles Inland, but was in the direct path of the terrible gulf storm, which swept inland almost at this spot, and traveled westward, carrying death and destruction in its wake,
